

### Member Spotlight



Brijanee enrolled in the Financial Opportunity Center® (FOC) program in the summer of 2023 to regain control over her finances, Despite working full-time, she had little savings. She teamed up with her coach, Christy, to develop a plan for spending, saving, and debt repayment. Together, they chose the best student loan repayment option and created a plan to pay back taxes totaling about \$800.

Over the past year, Brijanee made consistent monthly payments on both debts, eventually paying off her back taxes and reducing her student loan debt. Throughout this process, she discovered what financial strategies worked for her. She found it easier to manage her finances by splitting larger expenses into smaller, bi-monthly payments. This approach and a promotion at work enabled B.M. to open a Self-Savings account and, most recently, a secured credit card. Brijanee feels more confident and organized overall.




#### Total Energy Assistance Applications Processed (EA)

#### Households Receiving Crisis Energy Assistance (ECIP)



#### **Weatherized Homes**











### **Strengthening Communities**



#### **Cole County**

Our office has moved! We are now located at 1515 E. High Street in Jefferson City. There will be an Open House in early October.

We served about 175 people at Project Homeless Connect, helping connect them with services and resources. Housing the Community Jefferson City (HCJC) is hosting an Unhoused Summit on November 7<sup>th</sup>. The summit will include breakout panels on day and overnight shelters, mobile units, affordable housing, and more.



#### **Moniteau & Osage Counties**

In Moniteau County, the MRED & SMSC childcare initiative hosted an early childhood training that provided 10 clock hours of education for child care providers. Trainers included DESE, MU Extension, and the American Heart Association.

Over 50 vendors participated in Taste of Osage in September. CMCA Head Start & Weatherization programs attended, and the FOC recorded a podcast to support and promote the event. State Tech provided a truck to collect food donated during the event's food drive, and those who donated received a Taste of Osage bag.



#### **Callaway County**

It's almost time for the Harlem Wizards! This fundraiser supports housing development in Callaway County. To date, \$4,500 in sponsorships have been secured and over 100 tickets have been sold for the event.

The Callaway Housing Task Force will host a town hall meeting on landlord & tenant rights in early October.



#### **Cooper & Howard Counties**

CMCA is partnering with the Cooper County Public Health Department on their Community Health Assessment. We are currently reviewing the data and have begun conversations about how statistics tell a story about health equity, disparities, and the way in which social determinants of health shape a person's life.

We are discussing next steps in our SMSC Howard County housing focus with Fayette Together. They are pleased we will work to recruit more landlords to encourage participation in the HCV program. We are also in the early stages of planning a USDA Rural Housing seminar with USDA housing specialists for community members who want to learn more about their home-buying options.



### **Early Childhood Program Updates**

September kicks off our 2024-2025 school year. We are busy getting to know the new students and families. The beginning of the school year means staff are busy conducting screening and assessments to ensure compliance with the program's regulations, as well as plan some fun parent engagement events.

Administrators have come up with some assignments that focus on the new Head Start Program Performance Standards. We have several items that have a compliance date of mid-October into the first of the year.

Exciting news! We have the keys to the Warsaw building, and we are working to move in items necessary to become licensed. As soon as we get closer to opening, we will coordinate an Open House.

Finally, we are hosting our Eat Healthy, Stay Active! parent trainings in November. This annual training helps parents learn about nutrition and simple exercises they can add to their family's daily routine and gives medical students an opportunity to work directly with families.




## Head Start Enrollment & Attendance September 2024




### Children Affected by Site Closures




#### **Actual Enrollment**

#### **Disabilities Enrollment**




### Head Start Enrollment & Attendance by Site

#### **End of Month Enrollment by Site**


as a Percentage of Funded Enrollment





### Classroom Children with Disabilities & Disabilities Concerns




#### **Classroom Mental Health Supports**




